# Stopwatches Ready as Prep Indoor Track Begins

West Waterloo and Cedar Falls High kick off the 1968 edition of high school track Tuesday with an indoor dual meet at 4:30 p.m. at the O. H. Latham Stadium track.

All of the County Big Four teams plus Hamilton, Liberty High of Cedar Falls begin the indoor season in early March, with the state indoor meet March 18th at Iowa City.

The basketball season at both West and Cedar Falls will be playing in district tournaments Tuesday, and both have boys who will join the track squad after basketball season, but who won't be needed for the season.

"I've got the nice out right now," said Waterloo Coach Dick DeLano, "and will get new more all the basketball team and two from the wrestling team."

### Young Squad

"We're a young squad, with about 40 sophomores," added DeLano. "But I've got to have

a squad with as much enthusiasm as this one. If they have the ability, to match their enthusiasm, we'll have a good year."

Some of the veterans returning of West include the leading point setter at last year as a sophomore, Dave Haynes, Raynes, a junior sprinter, ranked up 140 points for the Wahanki last season.

He was part of the mile relay team that set a school record last year, which also included Paul Block and Don Guma, both returning.

West registers currently on the horizontal board at Al Lerche, as well as; leader Larry Moore, high jumper Steve Gagner and sprinter Mike.

Rich Hitzak, a sophomore who will report from the wrestling team, owns the third best time in the 100-yard dash among Iowa junior high students, and will compete in the weight events with senior Gary Morgan.

The Big Six Conference de-

feating shot and direct champions.

Also back is Dennis Danica who holds the school record in the 200-yard dash. DeLano has hopes for Dave Haynes, distance runner Earl Foss, sprinter - vaulter Bill

Cedar Falls Coach Gene Calligan has the same problem going into the first meet Tuesday.

"I hope our basketball team does well in the tournaments, of course," said Calligan, "but we're handicapped during the indoor season until we get those boys."

Currently still playing basketball are sprinter - broad-

leumper Jerry Ward; the "Tip-ty" only half mile, Don Blum; 440-foot stopgutter Marc Johnson and high jumper Mike Staudacher, Steve Manion and Steve Coon. Jerry Wehert breaks the discus for CF, but his event won't be run until the outdoor season.

The Tigers have a strong pole vaulter in senior Kevin Ford, who went 13-1 1/2 indoors last year before injuring most of the outdoor season because of injuries.

"We have a lot of 'between' boys," said Calligan, "but with all the injuries we had last year, we returned more kids than we probably would have normally."

Senior lettermen back are Bruce Siglow, Steve Bright, Paul Jeff Frank, Don Johnson, Marc Johnson, Jim McCarter, Jerry McMillan, Randy Schoenfelder and Ward. Juniors are Dave Anderson, Mike, Mark Brees, Glen Buel, Steve Becker,

Rich Larsen and Persson.

One of the Tigers lost is John Taylor, who College feels was one of the most promising sophomores to come around in some time.

The sprint champion in last year's championship meet had knee surgery and is lost for the year.

Byrd also handles, as does junior sprinter letterman John Kell. Distance runners Gene Stoen and Larry Sullivan and middle distance men Greg Worthington and Loren Creighton return, as does 440-foot pole vaulter Marvin Men-

roe.

"Our sophomore team last year was down," said Miller, "but I'm real pleased with our current sophomore group."

One of those is Jerry Moore, currently playing basketball. Moore high jumped 6'3 1/2 last year as a freshman, and handles and runs the 440 well. A junior non-athlete, Bob Beltran, will be in hard to compete for Miller in street

In either case, Page 2 must be completed and signed by the exchange visitor. An application for an extension of stay or Program transfer will not ordinarily be approved if the purpose is to undertake a new program objective.

(b) Limitations on Stay: GRADUATE NURSES - 2 years; DOCTORS OF MEDICINE - 5 years for internships and residencies; MEDICAL TECHNOLOGISTS, MEDICAL RECORD LIBRARIANS, MEDICAL RECORD TECHNICIANS, X-RAY TECHNICIANS, AND OTHER PARTICIPANTS IN SIMILAR CATEGORIES - length of the approved training program plus a maximum of 18 months for practical experience, not exceeding a total of 3 years; STUDENTS - as long as they pursue substantial scholastic programs leading to recognized degrees or certificates. Form DSP-66 must be surrendered to a United States immigration officer upon arrival in the United States, except in the following circumstances: An exchange visitor who departs temporarily from the United States and seeks to reenter as an exchange visitor during the period of his previously authorized stay must present at the port of arrival upon his return a duplicate of the last Form DSP-66 issued to him. Such duplicate must be obtained from his Program sponsor. If found admissible, the exchange visitor will be permitted to retain the duplicate copy of Form DSP-66 and use it for subsequent entries during the balance of his previously authorized stay.

(d) Change of Status: Exchange visitors are expected to leave the United States upon completing their program and are not eligible to change their status while in the United States to any other nonimmigrant category except, if applicable, that of official or employee of a foreign government or an international organization or member of the family or attendant of such official or employee.

(e) Two-Year Foreign Residence Requirement: Section 212(e) of the Immigration and Nationality Act provides as follows: "No person admitted under section 101(a)(15)(J) or acquiring such status after admission shall be eligible to apply for an immigrant visa, or for permanent residence, or for a nonimmigrant visa under section 101(a)(15)(H) until it is established that such person has resided and been physically present in the country of his nationality or his last residence, or in another foreign country for an aggregate of at least two years following departure from the United States: *Provided*, That such residence in another foreign country shall be considered to have satisfied the requirements of this subsection if the Secretary of State determines that it has served the purpose and the intent of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961: *Provided further*, That upon the favorable recommendation of the Secretary of State, pursuant to the request of an interested United States Government agency, or of the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization after he has determined that departure from the United States would impose exceptional hardship upon the alien's spouse or child (if such spouse or child is a citizen of the United States or a lawfully resident alien), the Attorney General may waive the requirement of such two-year foreign residence abroad in the case of any alien whose admission to the United States is found by the Attorney General to be in the public interest: *And provided further*, That the provisions of this paragraph shall apply also to those persons who acquired exchange visitor status under the United States Information and Educational Exchange Act of 1948, as amended."

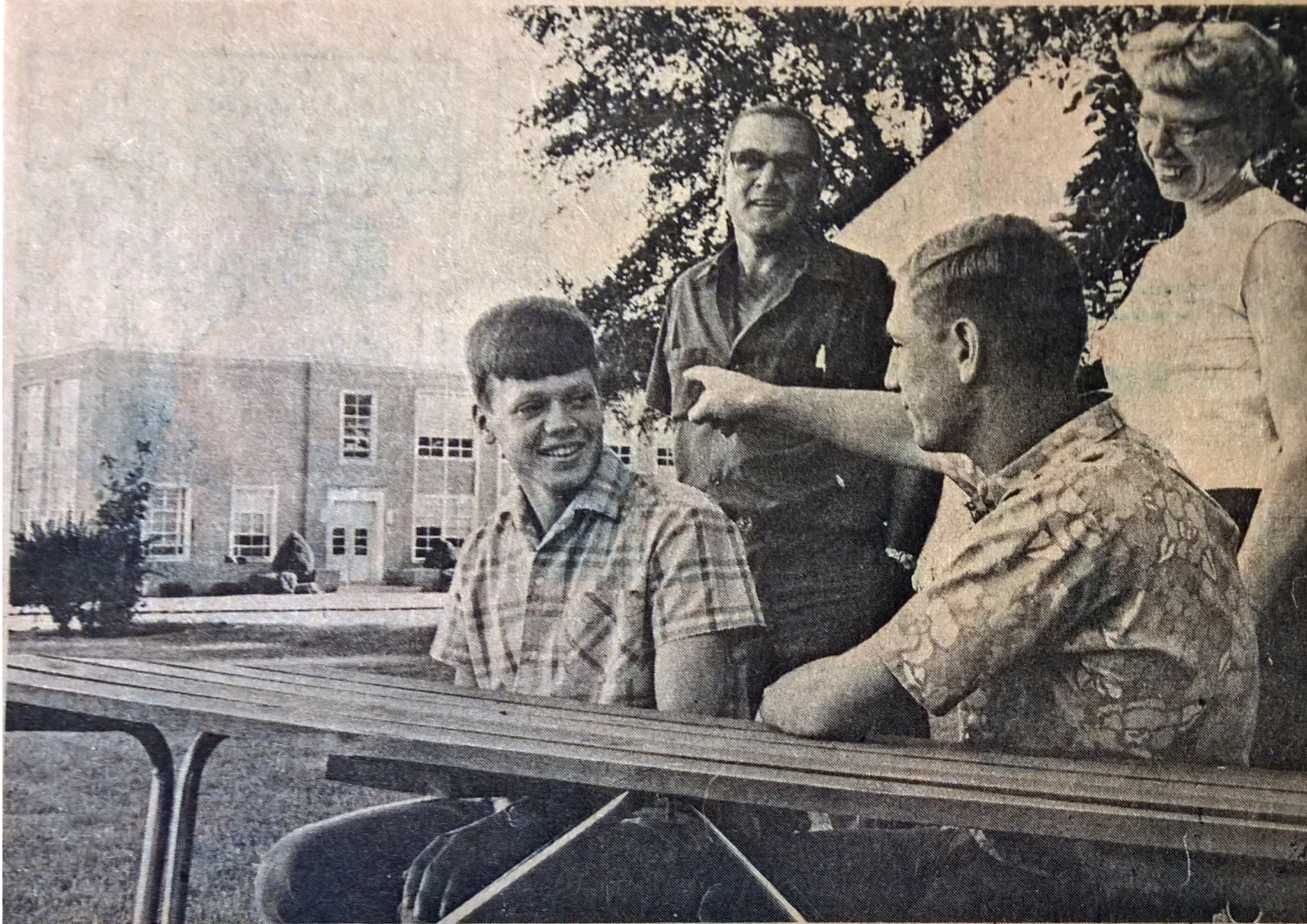
